Spiritual Practice:

Take an "Awe Walk" (Solo or with Family/Friends)

We're on the verge of spring! It's a great time to try the spiritual practice of taking an "Awe Walk." You can do it by yourself or with others. The practice is simple. Take a walk in your neighborhood or through a park or forest preserve nearby. Ask God for an open heart, open mind and open body to receive the beauty and wonder of creation. What do you notice? Up high? Down low? What do you smell? What sounds do you hear? Which people or animals did you observe? What gives you awe and wonder? Where do you see God's beauty?

The experience of awe leads us so naturally to what Anne Lamott calls "the third great prayer, Wow." She says, "Wonder takes our breath away, and makes room for new breath." It wakes us up to the presence of the God we seek in every moment.

WELCOME AND COMMON LIFE

EASTER SUNDAY - OPENING LITANY AND PROGRESSIVE DISPLAY

FOR THE BEAUTY OF THE EARTH: TRANSFORMED CREATION (I Cor. 5:17-19a)

We have walked together on this year's journey of Lent, through the days of Holy Week, and have arrived on this glorious Easter morning...

... For all of God's creation being restored to the way God intended it to be – full of life and beauty.

A beeswax Easter egg candle is lighted on each tier for the six aspects of creation highlighted in Lent: Air and Sky; Water, Rivers, Streams, and Oceans; Trees and Plants; Birds and Animals; Humans Caring for the Earth; All of Creation as God intended—full of life and beauty.

EASTER PRAYER (unison):

For you so loved the world, the cosmos, Holy God, that you gave your only begotten Son, so that all who believe in him will not perish, but will have eternal life. We, along with all Creation, listen for the Resurrected One calling our name. We await the Risen Christ opening our eyes to see Earth's crucified body transformed to new life. Amen.

CALL TO CONFESSION (Congregation may be seated)

When the women first encountered the empty tomb and the risen Christ, they were flabbergasted. "How could this be?" they wondered. They were afraid, yet they summoned their faith. 

The Racial Justice Committee is encouraging FPCW members to join in the **One Book, Everyone Reads** annual reading program sponsored by the Wilmette Public Library. This year, librarians have chosen <u>Three Girls from Bronzeville: A Uniquely American Memoir of Race, Fate and Sisterhood</u> written by Dawn Turner, former columnist and reporter for <u>The Chicago Tribune.</u>

Publishers' Weekly described the book as a "beautiful, tragic and inspiring memoir" about three Black girls from the storied Bronzeville section of Chicago. The book offers a penetrating exploration of race, opportunity, friendship sisterhood and the powerful forces at work that allow some to flourish...and others to falter.

Members of the FPCW congregation will have at least two opportunities to gather for group discussions about the book. Carol Korak's book group that meets monthly has selected <u>Three Girls from Bronzeville</u> as the subject of their **April 20** discussion. All

FPCW members are invited to join the 7 pm meeting at the church in the Upper Room in-person/Zoom. Then on **Wednesday, May 11,** members can come together for dinner at the church at 5:45 pm and then watch the library-sponsored on-line conversation between author Dawn Turner and Alex Kotlowitz, American journalist and best selling writer (no reservations needed). Kotlowitz is probably best known for his 1991 book <u>There Are No Children Here</u> that chronicles the experiences of two brothers growing up in Chicago's Henry Horner Homes. FPCW members are invited to stay around after the conversation to share in a discussion of the program.

Open to the Congregation and Community


