Spiritual Practice for Epiphany

The “Be Still” Prayer

The “Be Still” prayer is an important and simple spiritual practice I first learned from Fr. Richard Rohr. You can pray it anytime and anywhere - during a stressful episode in the hospital, when stuck in thick traffic, before you head to bed at night. “Be still and know that I am God” comes from Psalm 46, verse 11. To pray this prayer, take a deep breath and center yourself in God's loving, gracious presence. Then say “Be still and know that I am God.” Pause for a moment to rest in the reality of God's company and companionship. Then repeat the verse several times, leaving off a word or a couple of words each time. The entire prayer goes as follows:

Be still and know that I am God

Be still

Be

Move into a period of silent reflection, with your palms facing upward in a posture of receptivity.

Interfaith Action's Walk for Warmth

Please join our FPCW team to participate in **Interfaith Action's fourth annual Walk for Warmth on Martin Luther King Day, Monday, January 16.** Hosted by our longtime mission partner that serves those experiencing homelessness and hunger in our community, the race has become a holiday tradition. The event will kick off at 11 am from the Hinman entrance of First United Methodist Church, 516 Hinman Street in Evanston.

The two-mile Walk for Warmth brings community members together to walk a circuit of eight downtown Evanston churches, each of which serves as a host to the Interfaith Action Overnight Shelter. Walkers have the opportunity to raise (or donate) money to the project which honors the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Junior. There is no charge to register for the event, **but advance registration is required.**

Free parking is available at the public garage on Church Street, just east of Chicago Avenue.

FPCW has registered a team for the event, so please join us and bring your friends and neighbors for a chance to answer Dr. King's haunting question: "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, "What are you doing for others?"



Racial Discrimination in Housing

Although the Fair Housing Act was signed into law in 1968, housing discrimination still exists. Fair housing laws are intended to protect people from discrimination in housing transactions such as rentals, sales, lending, and insurance. Unfortunately, racial discrimination in housing still persists today, contributing to the ever-growing disparities in wealth, education, health and employment opportunities. The effects of racial segregation caused by redlining and other inequitable housing practices decreases home appreciation values, putting Black people at a disadvantage for building equity and passing on generational wealth. Racially segregated neighborhoods also manifest in the form of food deserts, racialized poverty and underfunded education from low property values. Please visit the resources below to learn

SUNDAY NURSERY CARE – 2ND ADULT – MEMBER VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

To continue offering Nursery Care during Worship services (ages 0-3); we need to ensure 2 adults are in the room each time – due to insurance requirement.

We currently have a professional Nursery Caregiver every Sunday along with 1-2 senior high youth. The 2nd Adult will be in addition to this caregiving group.

New Model: To comply with our insurance and provide a safe and welcoming nursery room, we are **asking all Adult members to consider joining a Volunteer 2nd Adult Rotation.** Ideally, we will have enough adults in this rotation so that each person only needs to volunteer **up to 4 Sundays a year.**

Every adult in the Nursery will need to have a current background check (paid for by the Church).
