THIRD READING - LUKE 1:26-38



ADVENT is the period of preparation for the birth of Christ. We base our Lesson & Carols service on a number of traditions in the ancient church.

CANDLES have always represented Jesus, the Light of the world. The Advent wreath holds four candles. They represent peace, hope, joy, and love.

GREENS have traditionally been used in the decoration of the church during the Advent and Christmas season. The evergreens symbolize life eternal.

BAGPIPES remind us of the close ties we have with the Church of Scotland whose missionaries established the first Presbyterian churches in the New World. The patron saint of Scotland is St. Andrew, whose cross is shaped like the Greek X. St. Andrew's Day is celebrated on the 30th of November, and Advent begins on the Sunday nearest this day.
